The Board is the governing body for the Primary School, while the Proprietors Trust is both the governing body for the kindergarten and playgroup, and owns the land and buildings.



**The children have been enjoying Matariki celebrations - as you read this, the children have probably just finished eating baked potatoes and hearing a Matariki story.

I have been struck at the way in which having Matariki as a public holiday is bringing about social change rapidly. It is deep nourishment for the soul to have a day that we collectively remember those who have passed, acknowledge what we are grateful for and set our sights on the year to come. The stars which were available for those who want them to hang on the remembrance tree outside the office have sparked conversations in the classroom.

Around the age of 5/6, children will naturally begin to ask questions around dying, as they begin to process the world and their own lives from a more aware level of consciousness. Children have been speaking freely and openly about those who passed in their families, and this normalisation around talking about death and new life is a boon for us all, as it strengthens our connection with our individual souls, and therefore, our shared humanity.

**On another note, if anyone has any suitable pots or pans etc. for use in the sandpit or with the outdoor kitchen, we would gratefully receive them. Ours are starting to look a little tired, and we could do with a refresh.
