Class Kea has been busy so far this term. We began with a week full of activities and celebration around Matariki. Our class focused on Tupuānuku, the star of food that grows from the ground, and Waitī, the star of freshwater. For this, we made kumara, carrot, and celery soup that we shared with the school community, did some harakeke weaving of ika and whetū, and wrote poems about how we celebrate Matariki.





We are now working on a new main lesson, Local Geography. In this main lesson we are looking at the whole and parts of our local surroundings. Using a compass rose, a legend, and




a birds-eye view the students have been mapping themselves at their desks, the

We invite you to pop into an ORC office or a Bee Card retailer to pick up a free Bee Card before 30 September, or ask your bus driver for one - and remember to register it by going online here: https://beecard.co.nz/ 5-12 years with Bee Card — FREE fares with a REGISTERED Bee Card If you're aged 5-12 years, you travel free on the bus. You must have registered your Bee Card online and must tag on and tag off. 13-18 years with Bee Card — 60c fares with a REGISTERED Bee Card If you're aged 13-18 years, you pay 60c per trip on the bus. You must have registered your Bee Card online and remember to tag on and tag off.
