Special Character Thoughts:

In our ongoing segment about the curriculum and what makes it so powerful for our children, we have made it to ingredient number 3:

"The importance of content is fully recognised (young people need certain skills and useful knowledge), but as a creative framework, the Steiner-Waldorf curriculum is embedded within a developing practice and method. The curriculum outline takes its cue from the development of the child: subject, or content, provides a medium for a meeting and collaboration of teachers and learners. Thus, since the meaning and knowledge are built over time, this is co-constructed learning in which understanding unfolds as a process of learning to learn encompassing both students and teachers."

The development of the child is a very powerful cue to base a curriculum on and while so simple it seems to sometimes get lost in thoughts of individuality as well as changing times that lead to changes in children's development. Children go through the same developmental stages they did 100 years ago, if we can surround them with the space and the time to do so. The curriculum, while appreciating the individuality of a child at its deepest core, provides developmentally specific input and substance to support the child in their next stage of learning and developing. The process of learning to learn for the teacher and the child means they build a relationship built on shared content experiences, thus building trust and a shared history while both developing on their journeys as learners.
