Anthroposophical Home Nursing Support Series

Join us for a 6-part series where we will explore holistic, Anthroposophically guided gestures and therapies to support the hauora of our whānau and wider community.

The sessions will run for 2 hours from 6pm to 8pm on Wednesday evenings, with two sessions per term for the rest of the school year. For the first hour of each session we will discuss the topic of the evening and the theory behind a therapy, in the second hour we will practice therapies on each other in hopes of building skill and confidence to transfer these nourishing practices into our homes.

Our first session will be Wednesday, May 10th at 6pm in the playgroup room/kindergarten room (depending on the group size). This first session will be centred on whakawhanaungatanga and an exploration of Anthroposophical care including an introduction to seasonal illness support. For this course to run effectively we will need a minimum of 10 participants, with a cap of 20.

Dear Kindy whānau,

A huge Thank You for everyone's hard work at the Fair. What a wonderful day it was, and such glorious weather. A Special Thanks to those of you who put in so much time and effort before the big day, making sure that it was a success. I spent the day in the cafe, and the range of delicious food was amazing. What really struck me was the beauty of the dishes - it was clear how much intention had gone into their preparation and presentation. Soul Food, for sure. It really brings home what an amazing community we have, and what we can achieve when we all work together.

This term we will be gathering during the last of the Autumn for the Kindy Lantern Walk. As we move into the darker, colder months of the year, we hold this light inside ourselves, and carry it through the shortest day and celebrate as we begin to move once more towards the light. We do this at the time of the Winter solstice with the Spiral Festival.

As the Earth moves around the Sun, we celebrate four celestial points of the year. The Spring (Vernal) equinox and the Autumnal equinox occur on the two days of the year when light and dark are in perfect balance. These days mark the midpoint between the Winter and Summer solstices, which occur with the extremes of the dark and light - the shortest and longest day respectively.

Of course, as we move into these colder months, we do need you to please make sure your child is adequately prepared: woolly hats, overpants and warm, waterproof jackets are imperative, as are spare socks, and a change of clothes in their bag.

Some of you will recognise Izumi Uchida in the Kindy. She is on her final placement for her teacher training. Izumi has a long history with our School - her daughter went right through, and Izumi served as the Board Chair for many years. It is a lovely circle for her to once again be involved with Kindergarten.
